cademic Year 2021-22: While UWC was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize, the Head of UWC Mostar was nominated for a prestigious award "Večernjakov Pečat" in Bosnia and Herzegovina. The nomination was in the category of "Pride of BIH - success of the year". The year started with the city of Mostar reaching out to the college to lead and coordinate the participation of all high schools in the Open City Mostar. We also had one of the UWC Mostar Student Council leaders elected to head the council of all student councils in the city of Mostar. During the course of the year, representatives of the Education Ministry and the local pedagogical institutes along with other local educators in the city were invited and visited the college to witness the facilities and the UWC and IB teaching and learning process. Another exciting achievement was the Teachers for Future program through which 46 teachers from 16 schools across the country attended in-person teacher training workshops at UWC Mostar!

In 2006, when UWC Mostar first started as a short term IB and UWC project, no one would have envisaged the way it would embed itself in the Mostar community and the special place it would make for itself as a shining example of a UWC that lives the mission in its special context. This was very much on my mind when in August of the academic year 2021-22, I undertook the formidable responsibility of leading this amazing college. It was also my privilege to lead it in a year when we were celebrating our 15th anniversary.

I am glad to report that the year lived up to all expectations and the 15th Anniversary celebration calendar had a lot to offer throughout the year. Aims and **Objectives**

The Foundation Education in Action, legal successor of the Finnish Association "From Conflict to Internationalism". has been established with the aim of contributing to the educational reform in Bosnia and Herzegovina and advocating for the introduction of modern teaching and learning methods in the curriculum, by offering professional development possibilities to educators in BiH.

Over 1000 teachers, headmasters, pedagogical institute employees and ministers have been part of the workshops, conferences and study visits organized under the Foundation's umbrella.

Elisabeth Rehn was the Patron of the UWC-IBO Initiative in Bosnia and Herzegovina, as well as the Chair of the Board of Directors of the Association "Education from Conflict to Internationalism", of which the UWC-IBO Initiative was a project. She was the United Nations Special Reporter on the situation of Human Rights in the Republic of Croatia, FRY, Bosnia and Herzegovina and FYROM (1995-1998) and the United Nations Under-Secretary General Special Representative of the Secretary-General in Bosnia and Herzegovina (1998–1999) and she possesses an extensive knowledge of the country and

region.



Lamija Tanović was the Chair of the Executive Committee of the UWC-IBO Initiative in Bosnia and Herzegovina and she held that position from the establishment of the Executive Committee in May 2005. Mrs Tanović is a Professor of Physics at the Sarajevo School of Science and Technology. She was the Head of the International Department for Education and Culture at the **B&H Ministry of Foreign Affairs** (2001-2004) and B&H Ambassador to Denmark (1994-2001)

Dr Pilvi Torsti (Finland) is the Chair of the Foundation Education in Action.

Dr. Pilvi Torsti is a State Secretary at the Finnish government. Prior to this position she served as an MP of the national parliament being a member of education and future committees 2017-2019.

Dr. Torsti founded and served as the CEO of a start-up company, Helsinki International Schools (HEI Schools) 2015-2017. HEI Schools offers a global preschool concept based on Finnish educational expertise and a Nordic approach to design in architecture, interior and learning materials.

University of Helsinki is HEI Schools' founding partner. Dr. Torsti served as the State Secretary and Special Advisor at the Finnish government also 2011-2015. Since 2012, Torsti has been an elected member of the City Council of Helsinki, and was a member of the city's Board of Directors until 2017. She has been involved in developing her political party's (Prime Minister party since 2019) policies on education, learning, science, innovation as well as the general approach around the UN Agenda2030 development goals.

Before her political career Dr. Torsti has overseen pioneering research projects at the University of Helsinki including Youth and History research project in Bosnia and Herzegovina in late 1990s. She holds the title of Adjunct Professor. Dr. Torsti was one of the founders of an international educational initiative in Bosnia and Herzegovina, which resulted in the establishment of United World College of Mostar in 2006.

UWC Mostar is registered as a private secondary school under the laws of Bosnia and Herzegovina. The College Board governs UWC Mostar, appoints the College Head (subject to the formal approval of the Foundation Education in Action) makes the annual budget, executes any of the functions and duties normally executed by a College board, and is directly accountable to the UWC International for adherence to UWC criteria and practices including participation in UWC meetings.

Jasminka Bratić (Bosnia and Herzegovina) served as the Assistant to the Minister of Justice of the Herzegovina-Neretva Canton (Mostar) and has an extensive professional experience within the legal system of BiH. She enthusiastically supported the opening of the UWC in Mostar, while serving as the Chair of the School Board of Gymnasium Mostar. Mrs Bratic strongly believes in education as being crucial for peace-building, which motivates her involvement in educational initiatives.

Ivan Lorenčič (Slovenia) was the Headmaster of the 2nd Gymnasium Maribor, Slovenia (an IB school since 1990). He was the Director of the National Education Institute of the Republic of Slovenia (1993-2000) and was responsible for curriculum development and implementation, teacher training, implementation of national external examinations and the reform of primary and secondary education. He has also been leading the Centre for the Professional Development of Teachers in Bosnia and Herzegovina since 2005.

Sandra Ann Thomas (United Kingdom) has 35 years of classroom experience, as a teacher of IB English, and A-level English Literature. At the United World College of the Adriatic (1995-2009) she worked as an English teacher, Head of Department and as Deputy Head (1997-2009) with responsibility for all aspects of the academic programme, pastoral care and university counselling. At UWC Adriatic, Mrs Thomas shared a residence with students for fourteen years. Her extensive experience includes participation in UWC student selections, IB examinations, and UWC audits.

Fleur Mejis (The Netherlands) serves as a Permanent Proxy for the Chair of the UWC Mostar College Board. As a partner at PwC in the City of London, she specialised in significant and complex audit and advisory projects with financial institutions in the City. She also served as a member of the Dutch Parliamentary Committee in respect of the Structure of Dutch Banks following the credit crisis. Mrs Meijs left PwC to become a non-executive director and to dedicate more time to charity work (as a non-executive director for Fidelity European Values plc, Invesco Asia Trust plc, and Ruffer LLP). In her efforts to give back to society she has worked for the children's development organization Plan International in West Africa, as a trustee of the British Museum Friends, and has set up with her husband the endowment for UWC Mostar, Bridge to the Future.

Andrew Bennett (United Kingdom) worked at UWCSEA in Singapore (1981-2004) the final 11 years as Head of College. He has also served as the Chair of the UWC Heads Committee. From 2006 to 2015, Mr Bennett was employed by St Joseph's Institution in Singapore, initially as the founding Principal of SJI International. He is retired and living in the UK.

Augusta Campagne (Austria, The Netherlands) is one of Europe's leading specialists in historical basso continuo performance practice. She is a professor of harpsichord and figured bass at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna, Austria. She is a UWC alumna.

Mirna Doyle (Bosnia and Herzegovina) served as the Development Director of UWC in Mostar when the college was established in 2006. She is an experienced education policy analyst, advisor and project

manager, specialising in education reform and civil society advocacy in BiH. Ms Doyle has worked in this capacity for several organisations in the country, including the European Union Special Representative, the state Agency for Preschool, Primary and Secondary Education, the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe, and the Open Society Fund in BiH. Ms Doyle is also an experienced writer and editor. She is currently living in The Netherlands.

Sead Filipović (Bosnia and Herzegovina) is serving as the Chief Finance Officer at the Secretariat of the Regional Cooperation Council (RCC) in Sarajevo. He holds a degree in Information Technologies and has worked for organisations including the Office of the High Representative in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and the International Commission on Missing Persons. He contributed to the development of the first budget of the UWC-IBO Initiative in BiH.

Rob Hilliard (Australia) has worked in residential schools in the UK, India (UWC) Australia and Austria. After completing his MPhil in Educational Research at Cambridge, he spent six years in the British Army. Beyond the classroom, Mr Hilliard has run large outdoor education and leadership programmes and facilitated trips around the world.

Dara Bonomi teaches Economics at UWC Mostar. She holds degrees in Economics and Economics of the Agro-food System from North Carolina State University and Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore, respectively. Prior to teaching, she gained experience working in entrepreneurship, marketing, and finance between Raleigh, Turin, Milan and Lausanne. Teachers for future

roject Teachers for Future was initiated in 2021 with an overall aim of improving the quality of secondary education in BIH for a more prosperous, peaceful and sustainable future.

The project consisted in the design and the delivery of a professional development programme for teachers with four modules spread over eight months of the academic year 2021/22.

The Professional Development programme included four modules, the first one being aimed at all participants and the three others aimed at specific subjects/subject groups. The modules were designed to be highly intensive and participatory, with the maximum opportunity for dialogue, debate and analysis in seminar style to provide participants with concrete ideas to take back into classroom and outdoor planning. The program consisted of a combination of live and online modules with application of training in school workshops and evaluation workshops.

All participants took part in the first online module "intercultural educational practices in BiH:Academics and Co-curricular programme, lessons learned by UWC Mostar" and additionally in one in-person model designed for their subject area.

Module 1: Intercultural educational practices in Bosnia and Herzegovina: Academics and Co-curricular

All participants took part in the first online module "Intercultural educational practices in BiH: Academics and Co-curricular programme, lessons learned by UWC Mostar" and additionally in one in-person model designed for their subject area: Mathematics, facilitated by Elmir Čatrnja and Marija Lovrić; English language, facilitated by Ivana Knježević and Ivana Pehar and Arts, facilitated by Saša Šantić and Enes Žuljević, UWC Mostar.

Overarching goal of this project was to move from short-term training to a longer-term professional development approach. The participants were not only receiving training but were actively contributing to the activities, including sharing materials. We believe there could be much more to do to create further opportunities for cross-regional teacher cooperation.

15 high schools and 46 teachers from all over Bosnia and Herzegovina and the fields of Mathematics, English and Fine Arts participated in 4 modules of the project. The project Teachers for Future was supported by the Schmitz Stiftung Germany.







UWC Mostar aims to develop educational practices relevant for post-conflict and transitional societies."

The college educates its students to value diversity while promoting equality, tolerance and critical thinking. Students come from all over the world as well as from all parts and nationalities from BiH and the region. All students live together, attend classes and volunteer in the community, providing a unique example of integrated education in post-war Bosnia and Herzegovina.

tional and are organized annually, with the aim of contributing to the development of post-conflict society, equality and peace in the community.



UWC Mostar embodies both the mission and the relevance of UWC to the fullest extent due to its location in a post-conflict region that still suffers from segregation in its communities. So it was an easy choice when asked whether I wanted to get more

involved!"



BRIDGE TO THE FUTURE

The UWC Mostar Endowment "Bridge to the Future" was set up in October 2013 with an objective to create an endowment to secure permanent funding for the College.

Bridge to the Future funds scholarships for students to attend UWC Mostar. The endowment has been set up as a charity in the UK to ensure good governance and best-in-class stewardship of donor funds. The capital of the endowment is invested and the income and capital gains are used to distribute to UWC Mostar to cover scholarships. One endowment to provide funding for a scholarship at UWC Mostar every year into perpetuity "costs" €300,000.

WHAT IS AN ENDOWMENT?

The endowment is a fund to provide long term financing for scholarships. The gifts of donors become the assets of the endowment and are invested in stock markets and other financial investments. The income and capital gains of the investments are used to make donations to UWC Mostar to cover the costs of students receiving a scholarship. The aim of the endowment is to preserve the value of the assets over the long term.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR

The endowment fund has a total of EUR 20 million in assets. In the last 2021-22 financial year, the endowment fund benefited from EUR 1 million of additional donations. Due to turbulence in the financial markets and an increased school fee, the total value of the fund slightly reduced by EUR250k to EUR 19.6mln. The endowment invests over a longer term horizon and aims to achieve a 5% return over the long-term. Whilst 2020-21 was a very strong investment performance year, in 2021-22 it was much more challenging and the fund had a small investment loss.

A big milestone was the award of our first UWC Mostar Alumni endowment scholarship. The EUR1 campaign was started in 2017 to ask UWC Mostar Alumni to donate to the endowment. Their donations combined with two matching schemes raised more than EUR125k allowing the fund to award its first scholar-

The endowment Board awarded 24 new scholarships to students starting September 2022 and combined with 22 second year students, bringing the total number of students with a scholarship at UWC Mostar from the endowment to 46. The donation from the endowment to the College increased by 15% in the 2021-22 academic year.

The endowment has also created 5 endowments for students from the Western Balkan Region to ensure these students will always be presented at UWC Mostar. This year, we have awarded a student from Kosovo and Croatia a scholarship, and in the coming year we will award scholarship to students from the other countries.

"EVERY LITTLE HELPS" -THE ALUMNI €1 CAMPAIGN

With more than 1000 alumni, UWC Mostar alumni can make a significant contribution by all donating a small amount every month. The €1 alumni giving campaign was started in 2017 to encourage alumni to give back to the College in the hope to set up an annual scholarship funded by UWC Mostar alumni. 


